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The Hastings Center

The Hastings Center is an independent, nonpartisan, and nonprofit bioethics research institute founded in 1969 to explore fundamental and emerging questions in health care, biotechnology, and the environment. Often described in the press as “the bioethics think tank,” the Hastings Center is a go-to resource for research, quotes and the latest thinking on ethics in medicine.

The Center’s research projects are grouped into five broad program areas: Genetics & Biotechnology; Health Care & Health Policy; Ethics, Science, & the Environment; International; and Ethics & Scientific Research. The published projects are diverse—recent topics range from genetic paternity testing to newborn screening to palliative care. The work is carried out by interdisciplinary teams that convene at the Center, in Garrison, New York, to frame and examine issues that inform professional practice, public conversation, and social policy.

The Hastings Center publishes two journals: Hastings Center Report, devoted to ethical issues in medicine and the life sciences; and IRB: Ethics & Human Research, which examines ethical issues confronting investigators, participants, members of institutional review boards, research administrators, and others involved in research with human subjects. Both are available to members and subscribers through the Hastings Center website at www.thehastingscenter.org.

The Center also includes the Morison Library, a resource for Center research associates, fellows, visiting scholars and others. A modest endowment, research grants, and charitable contributions support the Center’s work; the Center is a membership organization and offers individual, institutional, group, student and senior membership levels.



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
